

# A WORD FROM OUR COLLEGE CHAPLAIN



St. Paul has set for us the way to witness: "that you may become blameless and harmless, children of God without fault in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world." Phil 2:15

From September 12 (Thout 1) to September 28, 2023 (Thout 17), the Coptic Orthodox Church celebrates the Feast of Nayrouz, which is the feast of the New Year in the Coptic Calendar, 1740 AM.

The designation "AM" at the end of the Coptic year refers to "Anno Martyrum," which is Latin for "Year of the Martyrs." While the Coptic Calendar is one of the oldest calendars in the world, going back to the ancient Egyptians in 4240 BC, the Copts adjusted their calendar to coincide with the beginning of the Roman Emperor Diocletian's reign in 284 AD. Although the persecution of the Roman Emperor Diocletian (244 – 311 AD) was perhaps the most excessively brutal and widespread across the Eastern Roman Empire particularly in Egypt, his reign was considered a golden era in which the Church brought out the most sacred rank of saints, as many as three million martyrs, on whom the Church was, and is still, regenerated, nourished and flourished until this very day.

The word martyr  $\mu \acute{a} \rho \tau U \rho o \zeta$ , in its original Greek, means witness. A martyr is one who brings a testimony, usually written or verbal. In particular, the testimony is that of the Christian Gospel. However, over time many Christian testimonies were rejected, and the witnesses put to death, and the word "martyr" developed its present sense. Where death arises, the witnesses follow the example of our Lord Jesus in offering up their lives as a sacrifice of love.

However, we are all called to witness for Christ. The Lord Christ repeatedly commanded us to witness for Him to every person and to all the nations (Matt 5:16, Matt 10:32). St. Anthony the Great wrote to his spiritual children, "Martyrdom is for us all".

In order to be effective witnesses, we must have the knowledge of Christ, His salvation and be familiar enough with the Scripture to be able to accurately and coherently present the Gospel to others (1 peter 3:15). However, the validity of our witness will be shown in how we practically live our lives; that is our true Christianity will be known by our actions, not merely by our profession. Through few words but accompanied by true Christian love, the light of Christ shines upon this dark, absurd and suffering world. There are enormous words were said about the beauty of Christ, yet not many Christians have effectively put on Christ and sincerely lived according to His teachings.





# **SECONDARY SCIENCE UPDATE**

It has been a very exciting term for us in, in science. One of our greatest achievements this term was the success of our students in the Education Perfect Science Championship during National Science Week. For the first time ever, since we have been competing in this competition for a few years now, we received the first-place prize for a school of our size and overall, we received a seventh-place rank globally, out of the 1409 schools who competed in this competition. Furthermore 66 high school students received an award and some of these awards are for the top 1% of the state. We are so incredibly proud of our students and their achievement in science.





In other news, there have some exciting learning opportunities in year 8 who have been delving into the physics topic of energy and they are busily working on a STEM project to build a roller-coaster which demonstrates the various energy conversions and types of forces that they have studied. To assist in the application of their learning, many hands-on activities have been incorporated into the teaching program, to bring the science to life.

Meanwhile in Year 9, students have been studying the topic of "Sense and Control" and have been learning about the intricate anatomy and physiology on the human eye and ear, as well as the central nervous system, the peripheral nervous system, the brain and the endocrine system. These biology topics are often enjoyed by our students as this is where they get to perform some great dissections.

# Reading at home with your child

Reading is a very important skill that you can share with your child at home. Children develop literacy skills through shared experiences, both at school and at home. Here are some things you can do to help your child with reading at home:

Reading out loud

Children need to hear the words they are saying to familiarise themselves with the sound of letters and words. It also helps them use expression, which makes their reading more fluent.

Choosing something to read

Make sure there is a wide range of reading materials for your child to read. Allow your child to choose what they would like to read. Books can be borrowed from the school or local libraries or given to them by the classroom teacher.

Reading in your home language

If your home language isn't English, read to your child in your home language. Studies have shown that this can help your child learn to read in English.

Read everyday

Make reading a fun activity that you and your child can enjoy together. If it is part of the routine, children are more likely to want to read. This can also be a screen-free bonding activity for you to share.

Talk about what you have read

When you are reading with your child, talk about what is happening. Ask your child what is happening, what they think will happen next, or their favourite part. You can also try asking 'what if' questions, such as 'What if the story was set in space?'

Reading doesn't have to be a chore, it can be something that the whole family enjoys. Reading is everywhere - street signs, recipe books, newspapers, and shopping catalogues just to name a few.

Remember, teachers are here to help you with your child's reading journey.


First LEGO League: A Team of Innovation and Collaboration

#### Most Dangerous Social Media Apps Kids Should Not Use

When we say dangerous, worst or unsafe social media apps, we don't mean that the app itself is dangerous. What we mean is the abuse of these apps by people with hidden, deadly motives.

Let's take a look at some of the popular social media apps regularly abused by cyber villains.



#### Snapchat

Doesn't need any introduction at all. After all, it has millions of users from around the globe. However, the popular "bubble messaging" app does have its fair share of privacy and security issues that put many users' privacy at risk.



#### TikTok

Is one of the most popular videosharing apps with around 500 million active users worldwide. While thirteen is the minimum age required to use the app, anyone can download it as there's no proper way to verify age. Another concern for parents is the inappropriate language used in some videos, which isn't suitable for kids.



#### Ask.fm

Allows users to ask any question they want either as an anonymous user or as themselves. However, some people tend to make inappropriate use of the app's anonymity feature by asking vulgar questions and even leave offensive comments. Some even start bullying other users by making derogatory remarks.



#### Omegle

Is a video chatting application that allows two parties to indulge in a video chat while being anonymous. The user is addressed as "You" while the other person is addressed as "Stranger."

The app has garnered the attention of many critics who deem the application as a perfect spot for predators who are after unsuspecting kids.

Finally, The apps listed above and many more cannot be blamed in any way for how they are used, after all, a user needs to be smarter than an app. Please to talk to your kids and educate them about online safety.



# **COLLEGE REMINDERS**

#### General school uniform

- All students are reminded that they should be dressed in the Winter uniform this term and Term 3.
- Boys ties are to be worn with the school uniform at all times at an appropriate length. All ties must be straight and neat.
- Shirts and blouses are to be tucked in at all times, with top button fastened.
- Skirt, dress and tunic length must be on the knee.

#### **Blazers**

- Blazers need to be work to and from school Blazers are compulsory throughout the school year. They are to be worn to and from school, during Chapel, to school events, excursions, school photographs and when representing the school.
- · Layering Blazers are to be the outer garment, jumpers, cardigans and vests
- can be worn underneath. On extremely hot days, an exemption may be given to remove blazers. A decision will be made by the Deputy Head of College and students will be advised by their teachers.
- Badges The School Badge and House Badge are worn on the left side of the blazer collar. Other School Merit Badges are also permitted to be worn on the blazers
- Care and maintenance Blazers are to be kept clean, tidy, and have no
  missing buttons. Blazers are to be dry cleaned and repaired at the end of
  each term.

#### **Mobile Phones**

- Students are NOT permitted to have mobile phones in their possession during the School hours of 8:25am 3:10pm.
- They are to hand their phone into the front office for safe keeping each morning and collect it at the end of the day.
- Students with lockers may keep their mobile in their locker for safe keeping whilst on school grounds.
- If an issue were to arise throughout the day parents will be contacted via the College Office and the same channel of communication will be used if parents wish to inform their child of any urgent issues.

#### For Boys - Hair Update

Boys must have NEAT and blended hairstyles that are cut short to one length. It should not extend below the eyebrows or touch the shirt collar. Undercuts, steps, razored part lines or patterns, top knots, shaved sides, flat tops and spiked hair are not permitted. The hair must be no shorter than a **Blade 1**. Boys are expected to be clean-shaven and their sideburns short. No Skin fades, No Mullets and No side tapers.



#### For Girls - Hair & Nails

Girls must keep their hair off their faces and shoulders, regardless of the length of their hair. Hair must be completely and securely tied back including long fringes and strips of hair. Braids and half up/half down hairstyles are not permitted. Hair extensions or colored hair is strictly not allowed. Makeup, false nails, nail polish and fake lashes are not permitted. Nails are to be kept short and neat. Shirt length must be below the knee cap and girls must wear black or navy stockings.

#### **Borrowing a Chromebook**

In case of an emergency; St Mark's Library now has a number of Chromebooks that are available for students to borrow for the day. Students take full responsibility for the device.

#### **Study Sessions**

Study sessions are now available every Tuesday during recess and Wednesday during lunch in E4. Our senior students are offering mentoring and support during this assessment period. As always, we expect our students to show respect and consideration towards their teachers, peers and the school environment. This includes arriving on time and prepared for class, participating in all activities, completing homework and following the school rules.

#### **Primary Curriculum**

New English and Mathematics syllabuses is now released. New syllabuses focused on what is essential to know and do in early and middle years of schooling, and key learning areas in the senior years.

# Jewellery

As a general rule Jewellery may not be worn to College or to College events. Necklaces, bracelets of any material including rubber or string, anklets and rings may not be worn at any time with the College uniform due to safety reasons. Wristwatches are to be discreet (no smart watches permitted); Girls are permitted to wear a single gold or silver sleeper or stud in the lower ear lobe only: Gemstones are not permitted. A small Coptic cross may be worn around the neck.


